Dates for your diary

Our topic this half term is 'On the Farm'



Communication and Language

We will be learning to:

- Know many rhymes, be able to talk about familiar books, and be able to tell a long story.
- Be able to express a point of view and to debate when we disagree with an adult or a friend, using words as well as actions.
- Use a wider range of vocabulary



Literacy

We will be learning to:

- Engage in extended conversations about stories, learning new vocabulary.
- Understand the five key concepts of print: (meaning, purpose, directionality, parts of books, page sequencing)
- Use some of their print and letter knowledge in their early writing.



Maths

We will be learning to:

- Solve real world mathematical problems with numbers up to 5.
- Recite numbers beyond 5
- Extend and create ABAB patterns – stick, leaf, stick, leaf.

Physical Development

We will be learning to:

- Continue to develop our movement, balancing, riding (scooters, trikes and bikes) and ball skills.
- Use large-muscle movements to wave flags and streamers, paint and make marks.
- Skip, hop, stand on one leg and hold a pose for a game like musical statues.
- Increasingly be able to use and remember sequences and patterns of movements.



Understanding the World

We will be learning to:

- Talk about what we see, using a wide vocabulary.
- Explore how things work.
- Understand the key features of the life cycle of a plant and an animal.
- Begin to understand the need to respect and care for the natural environment and all living things.



Expressive Art and Design

We will be learning to:

- Make imaginative and complex 'small worlds' with blocks and construction kits, such as a city with different buildings and a park.
- Join different materials and explore different textures.
- Show different emotions in their drawings and paintings, like happiness, sadness, etc.



Personal, Social and Emotional Development

We will be learning to:

- Develop our sense of responsibility and membership of a community.
- Show more confidence in new social situations.
- Find solutions to conflicts and rivalries. For example, accepting that not everyone can be Spider-Man in the game, and suggesting other ideas.
